HEARING OF DELEGATIONS:

(A) BRANDON DOWNTOWN BIZ SKATE PARK AND SUMMER MARKET

Emmy Sanderson appeared before City Council to speak on behalf of Brandon Downtown Biz regarding the Downtown Summer Market, requesting Community Event Designation for the remainder of the Brandon Downtown Biz Summer Market 2025 in the City of Brandon.

Ms. Sanderson also noted that on Saturday, August 2, 2025, the Skatepark Graffiti Paint Jam will take place at Kristopher Campbell Memorial Skate Park from 12:00 PM to 5:00 PM. Five memorial pieces will be painted by various artists throughout the park.

City Council sat to hear representation with respect to By-law No. 7429 to close and convey a portion of Ussher Avenue, Peters Avenue and Public Lanes in Blocks 1 & 2, Plan 327 BLTO lying north of Stickney Avenue.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

(A) AGE FRIENDLY VERBAL JULY 28, 2025

Councillor Hildebrand provided a verbal report from the Age Friendly Committee meeting held on July 17, 2025. He noted that the committee's newsletter will be delayed until September, but highlighted the creation of a series of television episodes showcasing Age Friendly initiatives in Brandon, which will air on the Westman Communications Group station. He also reported on the finalization of a new Silver Alert program, developed in collaboration with the Brandon Police Service. Councillor Hildebrand concluded by announcing that the 2025 Brandon Health Check event will take place at the Keystone Centre on September 16, and reminded the public of the upcoming Senior's Days event scheduled for August 8 and 9 at the Discovery Centre.

(B) WESTERN REGIONAL LIBRARY BOARD VERBAL JULY 28, 2025

Councillor Cameron provided a verbal report from the Western Regional Library meeting held during June of 2025. He noted the WMRL's involvement in the downtown safety strategy and the CBC interviews on the topic. He also announced that the board passed a motion to allocate \$117,000 towards future strategic initiatives and outreach programs for Brandon and surrounding areas. Councillor Cameron concluded by reporting that they have received a \$6,000 grant that will allow them to upgrade their computers in both facilities.

(C) PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

VERBAL

Councillor Cullen provided a verbal report from the recent meeting of the Personnel Committee held on July 17, 2025. He noted that a new contract has been finalized with the Amalgamated Transit Union (ATU) that will include increases in wages, vacation entitlements, retirement allowances, and maximum sick leave accumulation

ENQUIRIES:

(243) UPDATE ON RESIDENTIAL TREE ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM #87829

Councillor Cameron enquired on the status of the Residential Tree Enhancement program, noting that \$100,000 was allocated in Budget 2025 and residents are interested in accessing it.

At the request of His Worship the Mayor, the City Manager confirmed the program webpage is now live on <u>brandon.ca</u> with an online application available. Promotion is underway via social media and radio.

(244) CLARK DRIVE BACK LANE REBUILD #87832

Councillor Cameron enquired if the back lanes in the 100 block of Clark Drive are scheduled for a complete rebuild, noting that grading has not resolved ongoing issues such as dust, drainage, and potholes caused by high traffic.

At the request of His Worship the Mayor, the City Manager confirmed the lanes have been inspected, graded, and treated with calcium for dust control. There are no current plans to reshape or reconstruct the lanes; however, additional spring snow clearing is undertaken to assist with drainage. Underground Utilities is also exploring options to improve drainage in the area.

(245) 2430 LORNE AVENUE SITE DIG REMEDIATION #87847

Councillor Cameron advised he had been contacted by a resident in the 2400 block of Lorne Avenue regarding underground infrastructure work done on the corner of his property in 2023, which caused significant lawn disruption and enquired where this falls in the queue for remediation.

At the request of His Worship the Mayor, the City Manager confirmed the work took place in December 2023. Asphalt repairs have been completed, and landscaping is expected to be finished by the end of August 2025.

(246) WILDFIRE EVACAUEES #88200

Councillor Cameron advised residents near Cherry Crescent reported ongoing noise, intoxication, and vandalism in the lane between the Clarion and Victoria Inn caused by evacuees. He noted that increased patrols has previously helped and enquired if these could resume.

At the request of His Worship the Mayor, the City Manager confirmed Brandon Police have increased patrols, First Nations Safety officers will be reminded to monitor the area, and the Canadian Red Cross security teams have been notified to enhance patrols.

(247) 34TH STREET RECYCLING DEPOT #88212

Councillor Cameron enquired if sanitation could address the excess garbage and non-permitted items being left at the 34th Street recycling depot location.

At the request of His Worship the Mayor, the City Manager advised that the City will continue it's efforts to educate the public on proper disposal practices. He also noted that the sanitation department endeavors to provide daily service to those depots during the summer months.

(248) CLARK DRIVE TREE REPLACEMENT #87831

Councillor Cameron advised that he had been contacted by a resident on the 100 block of Clark Drive regarding the time frame for completing ongoing tree and infrastructure projects in the area.

At the request of His Worship the Mayor, the City Manager advised that there are plans to address these issues by the end of the summer season or beginning of 2026. The City Manager noted that the tree in question would not be replaced due to insufficient space, but replacement trees will be planted elsewhere as per the City of Brandon tree protection by-law.

(249) REDUCED SPEED LIMITS AROUND PARKS AND TRAFFIC CIRCLE UPDATE

Councillor Luebke enquired whether a progress update could be provided on the pilot project that saw speed limits reduced in park areas, as well as the temporary traffic circle at Douglas Street and Princess Avenue East.

At the request of His Worship the Mayor, the City Manager noted that the matter was taken under advisement and that a report would be provided shortly.

(250) UPDATE - SPORTSPLEX ARENA PROJECT, OUTDOOR SPORTS COMPLEX & RECONSTRUCTION CIVIC SERVICES COMPLEX #88447

Councillor Luebke enquired whether a progress update could be provided on the Sportsplex Arena Project, Outdoor Sports Complex project, and Civic Services Complex reconstruction.

At the request of His Worship the Mayor, the City Manager advised that the Sportsplex Arena Project was projected to open in the late fall. The Maple Leaf Foods Sports Complex Clubhouse project was projected to be completed by the following spring; however, the soccer and cricket facilities had been completed, with reservations to use them scheduled to begin on August 5, 2025. Whether or not there would be an official grand opening was taken under advisement. He concluded by announcing that the Civic Services Complex was scheduled to have all employees back in the building by the end of September.

(251) FLEET PURCHASES & CAPITAL BUDGET #88448

Councillor Luebke enquired if a summary could be provided outlining the number of fleet items purchased, tendered, and deferred for 2025, as well as an update on the 2025 capital budget for fleet acquisitions.

At the request of His Worship the Mayor, the City Manager responded with an update on the project, including a breakdown of the proactive, phased approach to procurement. He noted that the budget is currently projected to be favorable but is expected to fluctuate as fleet purchases continue throughout the year.

(252) PROGRESS UPDATE - CROSSWALK INSTALLATION VICTORIA AVENUE AND RUSSELL STREET #88592

Councillor Parker enquired about the progress of the crosswalk installation at Victoria Avenue and Russell Street, noting that the motion had been put forward and approved during the 2025 Budget Deliberations.

His Worship the Mayor responded that Development Services were working on preparing the tender documents and would provide updates to the ward councillor when available.

- 7. The owner or successor submitting written confirmation to the City of Brandon Planning & Buildings Department that arrangements have been made for postal service to the satisfaction of Canada Post;
- 8. The owner or successor submitting written confirmation to the City of Brandon Planning & Buildings Department that arrangements have been made for addressing of the proposed lots to the satisfaction of City of Brandon Real Estate Administration;
- 9. The owner or successor completing a Heritage Resources Impact Assessment through a qualified archaeological consultant to the satisfaction of Manitoba Historic Resources Branch; and
- 10. The owner or successor submitting written confirmation to the City of Brandon Planning & Buildings Department that they have obtained a License to Construct Water Control Works from Manitoba Environment and Climate Change. CARRIED.
